I'm wondering what I'll spy on our next weekend excursion? You just never know. Good hunting!





NAQCC STATE QSO PARTY CHALLENGE BY DON VE3DQN

This year's Challenge is off to another running start. February saw 5 SQPs, and 26 NAQCC members made 2814 QSOs, dominating the QRP CW category in each of the parties. Seven members have already earned the first award level of the Challenge. A great show!

The Scoreboard http://naqcc.info/qsoparties_s-cores.html is showing some interesting patterns this year. New names/callsigns are appearing at the top compared to last year. Last year's two Diamond plus two Platinum award winners are noted by their absence, which leaves room for other contenders in the top ten.

I've also noticed at least eight new names/callsigns on our scoreboard list, that is, those who did not participate in the SQP Challenge last year. And three of these eight are already in the top ten! It's not

Chris KU4A #1960 The "season" is off to a good start for me. I improved my QSO count in all three (MN, BC, VT) vs. 2023. I'm hoping band conditions stay good so I can smash my totals from last year.

Ernie N2DGQ #11090 QSO Parties are a sign of warm weather to come, so therefore I'm glad to start the QSO Party season. I was able to work the MN and BC Parties, but I could not hear any VT on 40 Meters. I am in NJ so the higher bands will not work. I think most of them were working only phone QSO's. I was able to attain the silver level last year. I'm Looking to advance to the next level of Gold.

Stan K3PW #9637 Even though I've been a member of NAQCC for some time, I'm a new CW operator and a new QRP operator. After 6 months of consistent practice and increasing proficiency, in December I decided 2024 was the year to go all in. I had a great first weekend and got a big charge out of working BC from ME with only 5 watts and a vertical. Not a lot of contacts for the first weekend, but I learned a lot and looking forward to the next bunch of parties!

Ron VE3SIF #10033 It was fun hunting stations from the three QSO parties. I had the best luck with MN on both 40 and 20. VT stations seemed few and far between for me but managed to contact a few. Only three contacts with BC, all on 20. I was using my FTDX10 at 5 watts into an end fed half wave. For the next SQP I might try the QRP Labs QMX transceiver.

Will NQ2W #4839 SCQP - In and out of the shack throughout the day. Enough activity to keep it interesting but it seemed like in-state participation was a little sparse. I like the per band multiplier rule because it invites stations to try all the bands.


FIELD SPOTTING GUIDE TO RADIO COLLECTORS BY PAUL WORW #2500

Are You a Genuine Radio Collector, Investor Collector (Flipper), Hoarder, Socialite, or User?

- A Genuine Collector is one who finds, acquires, and restores equipment and accessories to transport themselves back to a bygone era and arespite from ordinary life. It is a pervasive human trait driven by a desire to create order amidst natural attrition of aging artifacts. A key driver is the association of the equipment with one's youth or career.
- 2. An Investor Collector (Flipper) is a predator on genuine collectors. They have only superficial knowledge or interest of the equipment. They infiltrate collector networks for personal gain. Capitalizing on the altruistic collectors, Driving the up the auction prices. Who would do that?
- 3. A **Hoarder** There is a narrow dividing line between hoarding and collecting. Both are driven by a compulsion to assemble and accumulate equipment but the collector will continuously improve the quality and diversity of the core collection. The hoarder only gains satisfaction from more of the same. In the extreme, it is a mental illness.

- 4. A **Socialite** uses his equipment to develop networks of fellow collectors, give talks at clubs. write articles, generate polls, etc.
- A **User** is more concerned with the operation and frequent use of the equipment.



NAQCC CHALLENGE BY GARY K1YAN #2365

This Month's Letter Challenge: Roman Communications

Here you are, on a Roman battlefield, commanding your legions. The battle continues and a change of plans has to be quickly communicated to the troops. How do you do that? Send a messenger and hope that he makes it through the battle in time and gets the message right? Risky business. Lets go with one of the two high tech approaches of the day.


HYDRAULIC TELEGRAPH

If the message is to perform a standard maneuver, like a calvary attack or a retreat, you can use the hydraulic telegraph system. A big jug of water has a spout at the bottom that will drain it when the spout is opened. A stick, with numbers on it, is floating vertically in the jug next to a pointer that marks a number on the stick. Pull the plug and the stick drops down and the number changes.

There is a list of maneuvers to match the stick numbers. Your commo man lights a torch and signals to get the attention of other commo men. When they signal ready with their torches, a signal is given, by torch, to open the spout and let the water run. When the water has drained enough to align the marker with the desired message number, another torch signal is given to close the spout and stop the water flow. Read the number by the pointer, check the list of maneuvers and you are ready to go.

POLYBIUS SQUARE

For those things that are not standard options, there is another choice called the Polybius square. Invented by the Greeks, it is a checkerboard like square with numbers along the top and left sides. The squares each have a letter



in them and together, contain the whole alphabet. This allows you to select a letter by using two numbers to indicate its position in the square by row and column.

The numbers are transmitted by using torches after an alert exchange, like in the water jug system. Numbers are passed by holding up the number of torches corresponding to each number to be sent in a predetermined sequence. Matching squares at the sender and receiver allow the message to be coded and decoded and provide a measure of security for the information.

A secure, digital messaging system from ancient times in action. Seems like pretty primitive technology, but, it got the job done. The principle of the Polybius square was used as the basis for some message encryption systems into modern times, but, the advent of computer analysis of codes made it too easy to crack.

NAQCC Awards

FEATURED AWARDS:

30-30

The 30-30 Award is presented as an alternative to the QSO-A-Day Award for those who for one reason or other just can't get on the air each and every day even for such a short period as a month. Note the new DX endorsement.

Time Frame For Qualifying QSO's:

January 1, 2006 0000Z through the present

Basic Award Premise:

Make 30 QSO's on 30 meters during a calendar month.

Categories:

- A Single Month
- B Three Months (30-30 Magnum)

QSOs:

Rag chew and DX QSO's are acceptable. Just sitting on the County Hunters Net frequency and racking up QSO's is not permissible. However, you may count a maximum of two QSO's from the CHN each month.


Other:

You can earn as many as 12 Single Month awards per year or as many as 4 30-30 Magnum awards per year. The months for the Magnums do not have to be consecutive. Once a month is used for a Magnum, that month cannot be used again for a future Magnum. That is if you use Jan-Feb-Apr for a Magnum, you can't use Jan, Feb, or Apr for any future Magnums.

If you earn a 30-30 for a single month and get a certificate, you may use that month toward one Magnum award as well.

I never considered Amateur Radio until later in life, much later in fact. A co-worker of mine who is a ham, was talking with me about it one day




PORTABLE GEAR

Our slow-speed CW nets are a great place for beginners to practice Morse code under real on-air conditions. Beginners will also find a wealth of helpful information on these web pages and we are more than willing to answer any questions about QRP, CW, and simple wire antennas that you might have. An extensive monthly newsletter is filled with useful projects and news from fellow QRPers.
